## Exceptional People's Olympiad Documentary Wins Award

The piece garnered the Bronze Plaque for the best short social documentary at the Columbus International Film and Video Festival that took place recently in the United States.

Broadcast on CBC Newsworld's Sports Journal in May 2004, and later aired on May 2004, the documentary focused on the 2003 Olympiad at Collins Bay Institution.

The event also provides an opportunity for offenders to make a valuable contribution to the community.

The film's title comes from the term given to inmates who team up with athletes to provide support and assistance throughout the weekend.
